COURTESY TO SALESMEN CALLING AT OAKLAND FACTORY IS STRESSED

To expedite the work of commercial men calling on the Oakland Motor Car Company, of whom there are more than 2,000 a month, Charles O. Miller, supervisor of purchases, has installed a courtesy plan designed to eliminate so far as possible the annoying wait in the lobby.

Under this system the information clerk checks the time of arrival of all callers having business with members of the purchasing department, and the time each caller had to wait before seeing his particular party.

In the operation of the plan during the past few months, the average wait each caller has been reduced to 3.16 minutes. The best day's average was 1.15 minutes. From 100 to 200 men are interviewed every day by the Oakland buyers.

A poster in the lobby says: "It is the duty of each buyer to see salesman promptly."
