NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN THAT A GENERAL ELECTION will be held in the Township of Farmington, Precinct No. 11, County of Oakland, State of Michigan, at Isaac Bond Schoolhouse, 1/2 Mile and Orchard Lake road, (Precinct No. 2) Elsie Young Beauty Parlor, Clawsonville, within said Township on:

TUESDAY, NOVEMBER 6

A. D. 1928

For the purpose of voting for the election of the following officers, viz:

PRESIDENTIAL—Fifteen Electors of President and Vice President of the United States.

STATE—Governor; Lieutenant Governor; Secretary of State; Attorney General; State Treasurer; Auditor General; Justice of the Supreme Court (to fill vacancy), for the term ending December 31, 1929; Justice of the Supreme Court (to fill vacancy), for the term ending December 31, 1930.

CONGRESSIONAL—United States Senator (for term beginning March 4, 1929); United States Senator (to fill vacancy), for the term ending March 3, 1931; Representative in Congress for the Congressional district of which said Township forms a part.

LEGISLATIVE—One Senator in the State Legislature for the Senatorial District of which said Township forms a part; One Representative in the State Legislature for the Legislative District of which said Township forms a part; Circuit Judge to fill vacancy in the Sixth Judicial Circuit.

COUNTY—Judge of Probate, Prosecuting Attorney, Sheriff, County Clerk, County Treasurer, Register of Deeds, Circuit Court Commissioner or Commissioner, Drain Commissioner, two Coroners, and a County Surveyor, as provided for by Act 551, P. A. 1925, as amended.

PROPOSITIONS

There will be submitted to the voters of Farmington Township at the General Election to be held on November 6, 1928, the question of whether or not the Township of Farmington, Michigan, shall hereafter be nominated by a Primary Election in accordance with Chapter 5, of Act No. 351 of the Public Acts of 1925, rather than by a Caucus, as has been the practice in the past.

NOTICE RELATIVE TO OPENING AND CLOSING OF THE POLLS:

Act 351—Part IV—Chapter VIII, Public Acts of 1925.

Sec. 1. On the day of any election the polls shall be opened at seven o'clock in the forenoon, and shall thereafter as may be, and shall be continued open until such time as the Ayes and no longer; PROVIDED, that in townships the board of inspectors of election, in its discretion, adjourn the polls at twelve o'clock in the forenoon, and that the legislative body in townships and the legislative body in cities and villages may, by resolution adopted fifteen days prior to the election and published with the notice of election, provide that the polls shall be opened at six o'clock in the forenoon, and may also provide that the polls shall be kept open not later than eight o'clock in the evening of the same day.

THE POLLS of said election will be open at 7:00 o'clock a. m. and will remain open until 5:00 o'clock p. m. on the day of election, unless the Board of Election Inspectors shall, in their discretion, adjourn the Polls at 12 o'clock, noon, for one hour. 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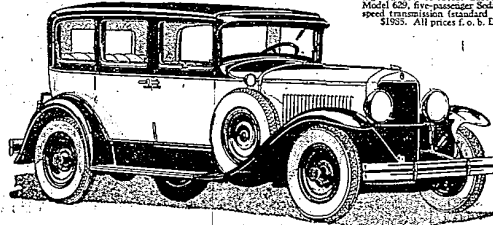
