## 2 PROCLAMATIONS ISSUED REGARDING ARMISTICE DAY

Myron J. Carrier, County Commander, And Mayor Make Messages Public

A proclamation relative to Armistice Day has been issued by Myron J. Carrier, of Farmington, County Commander of the American Legion, and will be published in newspapers throughout the County this week. The proclamation by Mr. Carrier is as follows:

"In this year, which is the tenth anniversary of the signing of the Armistice, let us strive to carry through to a pleasant ending a great celebration.

"We would pay homage to those who did not return to their homeland and friends. We owe this tribute not only to those comrades, but to their loved ones who survive them. Our associations with the lost ones in the world's struggle do not permit us to forget them.

"We would also rejoice on this day, the Armistice Day of ten years ago that permitted us to return to our homes and loved ones, to resume our peaceful occupations and to renew our friendships. It gave us the opportunity to readjust ourselves and to live the life we had formerly been accustomed to, and to forget the experiences of destruction, horror, waste and death.

"We who have organized ourselves into fraternal groups and clubs should sponsor and carry out a Memorial Ceremony fitting to the occasion, and all patriotic service organizations should be represented.

"The people of our great Republic will bow their heads and pay homage to those who made the supreme sacrifice and to those sons and daughters who did their part for their country in the great conflict.

"Then let bells ring, and sirens sound, so that the spirit of November 11th, 1918 may prevail once more."

Mayor Wells D. Butterfield on Wednesday issued the following proclamation:

November 11th, 1928 will witness the Tenth Anniversary of the Armistice which brought to a

close the great struggle of the World War and thereby ended the sacrifice of lives and the suffering of men and women for the sake of their Country. It brought a new era of peace and better understanding among nations and the ten years that have since elapsed have increasingly served to show the fallacy of war and the advantage of good will and mutual understanding among nations. The happiness and contentment of our people is a reflection of the past ten years of peaceful pursuits. It is only proper and fitting that on the Tenth Anniversary of this occasion, we especially observe the day and renew our allegiance to the principles of democracy and the cause for which our soldiers struggled and gave their lives.

Therefore, as Mayor of the City of Farmington, I request that on Monday, November 12, the day of this year on which Armistice shall be observed, flags be displayed at the homes and places of business in our City, and that all of those who find it possible may participate in the Armistice services to be held on Sunday, November 11th, and the Armistice celebration on Monday, November 12th, sponsored by the World War Service Organizations of Oakland County.

## Charter Amendments Are Given Good Majority

that the amendment would be passed, the margin by which it was adopted was a pleasant surprise to those who were supporting it. It was expected that the vote would be somewhat closer, with somewhere between 60 and 70 per cent as the result.

Amendment No. 2, permitting the City Commission to add candidates where there are less than two in an election, but removing the provision which made this mandatory, carried by an even larger majority, the vote being 310 to 100.

Many of those voting failed to register their opinions on the amendments, as is indicated by the total of 490 votes cast in the City.

Specifically, Amendment No. 1 eliminated the clause in the City Charter which stipulates that assessments for special improvements shall not exceed 25 per cent of the valuation of the property assessed at the last previous tax roll.

Women's Vote Large  
Marked by the largest proportion of women's votes ever cast in the City of Farmington, and by an overwhelming majority for Herbert Hoover and the entire Republican ticket, the City Election Tuesday drew 70 per cent of registered voters to the polls in the Town Hall. Of the 490 voting, 220 were women.

ed the largest vote of any leading candidate, polling 414, while Herbert Hoover was given 372 votes for president. "Al" Smith and William Comstock, Democratic candidates for president and governor respectively, each received the same number, 63 votes.

Practically all the other candidates on the two tickets ran in proportion, the average being between five, and six to one. The City vote did not quite come up to expectations, and election officials said it was under the total cast in the presidential election of 1924.
