MITZI, IN NEW COMEDY, COMING TO THE SHUBERT OPERA HOUSE NEXT WEEK

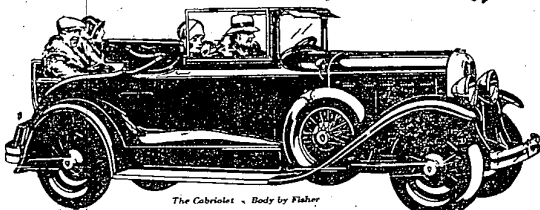
