SOUTHFIELD BEATS AMHERSTBURG, ONT. GRID TEAM, 12 TO 0

Robinson, Aided By Good Interference, Runs Over 50 Yards For Score

Southfield defeated Amherstburg 12 to 0 in a hard-fought game Sunday.

It was a defensive battle at first, with Southfield having the advantage.

At the start of the second period, a punt to the 47-yard line was caught by Robinson, who with the linemen and backs blocking well, ran twisting, pivoting and sidestepping to the goal for the first touchdown. The pass for the extra point was not completed.

Shortly after the kickoff Jacobs was forced from the game with a dislocated rib and was replaced by Hall. The Southfield team started a smashing drive to the Hornet's 35-yard line, where Hall was called back to pass and shot the ball into the waiting arms of Robinson as he crossed the goal for the second score. The attempted place kick was blocked.

The second half saw neither team able to score, although Southfield continually threatened the goal.

Salow stood out on defense, breaking through time after time, hurrying the plays, blocking the punts, and intercepting one pass.

Next Sunday the Southfield team plays the Pontiac Independent team, which two weeks ago held Bonnie Friedman's Wolverines to a 28 to 0 score.
