Amendment No. 2: Relative to the Number of Candidates to be placed on the ballot at City elections.

Whole number of votes cast, 400, of which number 310 were yes and 100 no.

Motion made by Hogle, seconded by Johnson, that whereas each Amendment having received more than sixty per cent of the votes cast for said Amendment, they are hereby declared adopted and a part of the Charter of the City of Farmington.
