MOTION PICTURES OF STATE'S WILD LIFE SHOWN HERE

Walter E. Hastings Of Conservation Department Exhibits Movies

Motion pictures of Michigan's forests, and the work being done to preserve and rehabilitate them, were shown by Walter E. Hastings, of the State Conservation Department, to members of the Farmington Exchange Club and school children in Methodist Community Hall Wednesday afternoon. Several reels showing the widely-varied wild-life of the State were also exhibited.

Prior to the showing of the pictures, Mr. Hastings reviewed the work of the Conservation Department, which, he said, has been brought out of immense inefficiency to a high standard in the past two years.
