Although it's tough to reproduce the sound live, Gage feels it has its advantages. For instance, if the crowd's not dancing to a particular song, he can skip on to the next one. Groups who use pre-recorded musle don't have that advantage.

Its rave history has also been successful, NASA influenced the nation's first rave tour with Moby and Prodigy by designing the filer and production. It continued its heavy influence by throwing Brazil's first rave/dance parties which attracted more than 3,000 people. Technically the "Sec The Light" tour has all the makings for a regular concert tour. On the tour posters, however, DB warns people not ocxpect the usual concert format. He said it's an interactive dance experience with the talent and audience thriving off each other's energy. "If you expect to be entertained (by just standing around), you'll be bored."
