In the past two games, Jason Granger was held to 54 yards and Joo Pesci completed 15 of 43 passes for 148 yards. Pesci attempted 21 passes against Rice and not 64 as reported Monday.
"We hope to establish the running game, so we can set up the passing game and not have to throw all the time," Herrington said.

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
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
