Real estate boards link up to improve service

Three Oakland County boards of Realtors are consolidating services in the name of cost effectiveness and efficiency.

The Birmingham-Bloomfield Board of Realturs, the South Oakland County Board of Realturs and the soon-to-be formed Metro Detroit Board of Commercial Relators will create the Professional Associations Survice (PAS). The new operation will couple both existing board's staff and offer programs for real estate professionals. However, each board will still function autonomously with an elected board of directors when it comes to making policy.

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"For too long we've operated as separate entities. . We're doing what most other companies are doing right now. We're trimming the fat," aid Joan Downing, broker/owner of ReMax in the Hills and member of the Birmingham-Bleomfield Board of Realtors.

"This is a positive thing of the future. We're hoping more (boards) join us," she added.

Greater exposure

The bottom line for consumers is the added exposure their property will receive when put on the market, according Downing, in addition, to cutting down on costs for real estate companies.

Other states such as Virginia, Florida and California have made similar moves, said G. Warren Gould, the outgoing executive vice president of the Birmingham-Bloomfield Board of Realtors, whose job will be eliminated as a result of the reorganization. Mourice Richards, executive director of the South Oakland County Board of Realtors, is retiring.

A new director has been hired to head PAS. John (Jack) Barry of fort Meyers, Pln., will begin his duties at the end of November, although the new group is not expected to be up and running until the first of the year.

This is really expanding and upgrading our services by having them all combined," said Richard, referring to the newly created PAS, an idea in which he initiated.

to \$600 annually, plus operational expenses or user fees to hook up to each groups' MLS.
"This is going to be good for the industry. Everyone will be on the same page," he said.

More efficient

Over the past few years, Realtors have been searching for a
more efficient way to offer the
MLS services. The solution was a
regionalized system for Oakiand
and Wayne counties called Real
Comp II.

The fees which real estate
boards charge for the listing service generates much revenue, and
the loss of the revenue from forming Real Comp II was one of the
reasons to consolidate the service
end of the business.

Seven boards will be under the MI.S service including the South Oakland County Board of Realtors, the North Oakland County Board of Realtors, the North Oakland County Board of Realtors, the Rochester Board of Realtors, the Western Wayne-Oakland County Board of Realtors, the Western Wayne-Oakland County Board of Realtors, the Dearborn Board of Realtors and the Dearborn Board of Realtors.

While Real Comp II will be headquartered in Farmington Hills, the location for PAS has yet to be determined by the existing boards of directors.

The South Oakland County group is located in Royal Oak and the Birmingham-Bloomfield group is in Bloomfield Township. Both sites could be abandoned for a larger office location, according to Gould.


