CITY OF FARMINGTON SUMMARY OF ORDINANCE C-605-93

THE CITY OF FARMINGTON ORDAINS:

Section 9, Subscriber Service Rates, of Article III, of Appendix A, Franchises, of the City Code of the City of Farmington, is hereby amended as follows:

Requires the grantee to establish initial rates for service in accordance with Federal Communications Rules. Adopts by reference the Federal Communications Rules governing Cable Rate Regulation.

Required cable operator to submit all documentation regarding any requests to increase service rates to the City of the Art CFR 0.459 regarding confidential business information with failure to comply with rate decisions subjecting cable operator to monetary forfeiture.

Delegates to Southwest Oakland Cable Commission authority to regulate cable television rates subject to Franchise Agreement.
