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# 'Gold Star Taxi' gave free rides

Need a lift? Call Gerry Carlin.
Oakland County Sheriff's deputies at the
Rochester Hills station were frequently ordered by Carlin to taxi politicians and business leaders to the airport, the doctor's office dered by Carilli to tax politicians and some ress leaders to the airport, the dector's office and even the beauty parlor, according to an investigation conducted by the county pro-secutor's office. Dorls Keylon, the former top aide to Ro-chester Hills Mayor Billie Ireland, loved to use the "Gold Star Taxi," as it was commonly beaum.

In her interview with the presecutor's office, Keylon admitted that deputies drove her on several occasions to the doctor's office while she was undergoing physical therapy for her knee.

A deputy once drove Keylon and her hus-hand back and forth to the airport for a vaca-tion in Florida. Keylon said she thought the deputy was off-duty.

Several deputies assigned to the "Gold Star Taxi" told investigators they took Keylon to the beauty shop more than once. She denies ever getting a ride to the hairdressor.

Keylon wan't the only one getting free taxi rides from Rochester Hills deputies.

### 'Miss Daisy' rides again

COUNTY Executive L. Brooks Patterson was driven around so much during his 1992 political campaign that Rochester Hills deputies referred to the assignment as Driving Miss Daisy, after the popular film.

The deputies also gave frequent lifts to Waterford auto dealer Al Dittrich and Rudy Lozano, the county road commission chairman. Both are Patterson supporters and close friends of Carlin.

In separate interviews, both denied knowing

the deputies who gave them rides were on duty. Carlin used his authority to help get Patter-son elected, transforming the Rochester Hills station into Patterson's 1992 campaign head-

station into Patterson's 1992 campaign head-quarters.

Sgt. Dale Miller told investigators that when Carlin was running the station, he fre-quently took deputies off their assigned duties so they could drive Patterson to fund-raisers and other social events. He said there were at least five deputies who were frequently placed on the driving detail.

Even the clerical help was involved in get-ting Patterson elected.

Miller said the station's two police secretar-ies sometimes didn't have enough time to type detective reports because they were so busy working on the Patterson campaign. He said it was common for the secretaries to take their work home with them.

Looking for donors
Contributions to Patterson's campaign were encouraged at the station. According to Miller, Carlin asked everyone at the station to supply a list of five to 10 people who could be solicited for political contributions to Patterson.

Miller emphasized the secretaries and the deputles worked at Carlin's specific direction. He also told investigators it's unlikely Patterson didn't know he was being driven in county vehicles, since the cars were fitted with police radios and other gear.

Patterson claims he thought the deputies were volunteering their time and driving privately-owned vehicles. An excerpt from an interview included:

Investigator: "I just wondered that, if in your opinion, what the chances are if someone took me around there and they took me there, but I didn't know it was a police car. I thought

it was his own personal car."

Before taking office, Patterson served as the a county prosecutor for 16 years.

Carlin, 38, is charged with 33 criminal counts following a 10-month probe into the Rochester Hills station. Prior to the charges., Carlin was demoted from captain to a juil spergeant. He's now suspended without pay, pending the outcome of his case.

In several past interviews, Carlin has adamently denied ever ordering deputies to drive. Patterson while they were on duty.

But Miller told investigators he personally witnessed Carlin taking documents from thestation that show he approved of the driving details.

several detectives, including himself, made,

Turning down a request from Carlin,
