Furniture baron Art Van Elalander, also owner of several Scott Shuptrine stores, rescued the Detroit Thanksgiving Day Parade from financial difficulties almost a decade ago. The stores' display at the Festival of Trees includes a seven-foot tree decorated with candles, poinsetties, birds and dry flowers. Underneath are baskets of fruit and standing nearby is a jolly six-foot Santa Claus.

"We've been doing this for the last 10 years. Last year we were invited to do the trees for the Maury Povich Christmas Show. We'll probably do it again this year," Palasty said.

It took 10 hours just to put the 3,000 white lights on one towering 10 foot tree — the Friendship Tree. Bloomfield Hills residents Jane Iscobelli and Susan Baker, both members of the Children's Hospital auxiliary board, stayed at Cobo Center until midnight Wednesday getting the tree ready for Saturday's opening.

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Both women returned early the next morning to complete the job. There were 286 land-blown crystall ornaments to be hung. The auxiliary began selling the ornaments, made by Pontine artist George Bochning, in September as a fund-raiser for the hospital. There also were large snowflakes and other decorations that needed to be hung on the tree.

Rob and Maria Schweers of Farmington Hills, also members of the hospital auxiliary, were helping to decorate the Friend-ship Tree, commenting on how it had put them in the holiday mood.

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
