

Shared Time Programs Are Increasing In Area Schools

As the cost of educating children rises, both public and parochial schools have been caught in a financial pinch.

Parochial schools, which must place the major financial burden on the student and his family, have been especially hard-hit in terms of such costly matters as curriculum innovations, laboratory facilities and gymnasiums.

Consequently they have sometimes had difficulty providing all the services which are offered within the public schools.

TO COUNTERACT this problem, a program called time-sharing has been initiated. Time-sharing is not to be confused with auxiliary aid which is required by state law and demands that public schools furnish transportation, speech correction, special education and nursing care to parochial students if these services are requested.

Time-sharing, as the name implies, is an actual sharing of the school's time and facilities. If a parochial school does not offer a specific foreign language and the public school does, the public school may allow a given number of parochial students to enroll in this class.

STUDENTS ARE enrolled in the both schools. For one period a day, they attend the public school class. They are graded by the public teacher and receive credit there.

The major setbacks have traditionally been overcrowding within the public school, and the necessity of having a parochial school close enough so that students could easily and quickly move back and forth between the two.

Magr, Thomas P. Beahan, of Our Lady of Sorrows Church and school, explained the plight of the parochial school.

"Our high school is geared to a liberal arts college preparatory program. Smaller schools like ours can't have as great a variety of courses. As a result of this project, all of St. Hilary's sixth graders attend both schools, and St. Hilary has been able to have one less instructor.

THE SYSTEM initiated in cooperation with Farmington High School this fall has 43 Old students daily enrolled in art, language and industrial art courses.

The number of students admitted to the public school, as in other schools which have adopted this program, is based on the number of class openings available.

Our Lady of Sorrows students are able to walk the short distance to classes in art, Spanish, Latin, French, German, and industrial art, and still be in their regular classes on time. According to James Geiger, principal at Farmington High, the reaction has been favorable on both the teachers' and students' parts. Students attend after-school functions, assemblies which are held during their hours there, and are issued identification cards.

REDFORD Township's Mason Elementary School has been one of the leaders in the time-sharing program at the elementary level. Redford Township's population, according to Vern Knight, principal of Mason School, is divided almost equally between Catholics and non-Catholics.

Community relations have traditionally been good, so Redford Township's Board of Education, decided four years ago to start a pilot project which would allow time-sharing. Mason was selected as the school. Mason Elementary are located across from each other at the end of a dead-end street, so there is little danger of street crossings.

ADMINISTRATORS from the two schools decided that 68 St. Hilary students would attend Mason. The school, which has hired an additional instructor, has 24 classes in the morning session, and 34 in the afternoon.

Although Thurston High School, also in Redford Township, has not initiated a time-sharing project as such, parochial students take part in the after-school driver's education class.

JAMES ROSSMAN, superintendent of the Plymouth School District, summed up the feelings of all public school administrators in the Observational community by saying, "Our philosophy is to serve all the children in the area."

While Plymouth has not adopted a time-sharing program, Rossman explained, "We believe in shared time, but we have a fairly limited non-public school enrollment. There are only about 600 students within the district."

"We won't request such a program," he said, "but if we were approached, we would certainly go along with the idea." He also said that the Plymouth Schools will continue with the auxiliary aid, but have no immediate plans for time-sharing.

IN GARDEN CITY, specialized public teachers go to parochial schools on a scheduled basis. All testing (within the guidance area) is done by the public teachers, as is counseling, speech correction, and instruction for home-bound students. Students and adults often enroll in summer school and adult education programs.

Robert Mosley, public relations director at the Garden City schools said, "there is a tremendous by-play between the two school districts." However, there are no immediate plans for a more comprehensive time-sharing program within the immediate future. Mosley cited the long distance between schools as one of the major blocking factors.

LIVONIA public schools, according to Dr. Robert Johnson, assistant superintendent of curriculum, "have not discussed this on any serious level." He went on to say that the majority of parochial students at the high school level are not incorporated within the Livonia system.

As is required by law, bus-

ing and other special services are rendered to parochial students, but the number of students using these facilities, "is constantly changing, and there is not an exact figure available."

GEORGE BELL, assistant principal of Wayne Memorial High School, which serves many Livonia students, began a time-sharing project several years ago when six top-level biology students from St. Mary High School enrolled.

This year Wayne school personnel is teaching the students physical education. Students are also enrolled in a computer programming course, operation of data processing equipment, and advanced art classes.

Memorial High School returned ninth graders in the junior high last year. Bell explained that this is one of the reasons why space is available for the 81 students now enrolled.
