Win over Troy a big hurdle for CC

Detroit Catholic Central reeled off 13 victories in its final 16 basketball games last season. Unfortunately, the Shamrocks began the year by going 2-7.

Coach Bernie Holowicki and his troops are bound and determined to get off to a fast start this season. That's why Friday's 68-55 victory over Troy in the consolation game of the third annual Clarkson Classic at Oakland University was an important.

Catholic Central was outscored 31-14 in the fourth quarter and it fell to eventual champion Rochester Adams 78-53 in a first-round contest Thursday. The Shamrocks turned the tables against Troy, going on a 26-14 binge in the final period to blow open a close game.

"We don't want to have one loss lead to another like it did last year," said Holowicki, whose squad is now 2-1. "We expect to have a good, consistent season."

What was the difference in the fourth quarter Friday?

"We played smarter than we did against Adams," Holowicki said. "We hustled and scrapped both nights, but we didn't gamble as much against Troy."

Troy coach Jim Clary was disappointed with the loss to Catholic Central, which dropped the Colts' record to 2-2, but he didn't think his team played badly.

"I was happy with our effort, and I thought we played well for most of the game," Clary said. "We had one bad stretch in the fourth quarter where

Catholic Central made some easy baskets off our press. We made some mistakes then, but we'll work on them."

Andy Slankovic led Catholic Central to its victory with 18 points. He was 3-of-6 from three-point range. Sean Gallagher added 16 points along with eight rebounds and Justin Hoener netched 14 points.

Kevin Krupitzer rebounded from a four-point game against Clarkson in Troy's 51-45 first-round loss Thursday to score 18 against Catholic Central. He nailed 12-of-14 free throws.

Brian Dukes added 10 points and Gary Prater and Arron Smith both had nine.

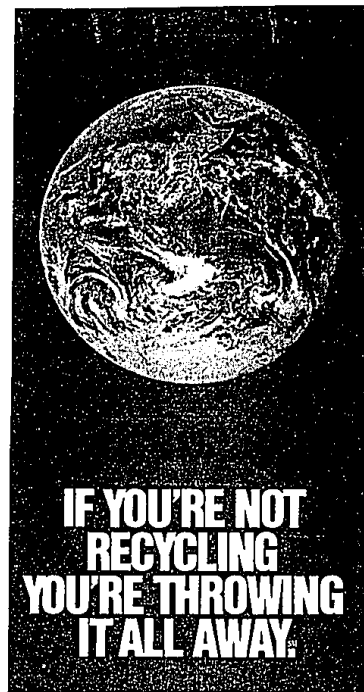
"Troy is a good team. This was a tough test for us," Holowicki said. "We enjoyed coming to this tournament because we get a chance to play top-notch teams we don't normally play; see other coaches and see other officials."

"We also enjoy the college setting. That's a treat for the kids. All in all, it's a good experience."

Catholic Central won the Clarkson Classic last year, beating Adams 48-44 in the finals.

Troy led Friday's game 10-8 at the end of the first quarter and 24-23 at halftime. After Catholic Central took its one-point lead into the final period, it went on an 8-0 run midway through the quarter to go in front 58-47.
