North Farmington gymnastics coach Jeff Dwyer is confident the Raiders will have another fine year despite losing a pair of excellent gym-

nasts.

The outlook would have been all the more positive, but Annie Jud decided to concentrate on club gymnastics and Jenni Japenga switched to the pompon squad.

Jud, though she missed most of leat season with a back injury, still placed 10th at the state meet on the vault, and Japenga was an all-around state qualifier.

"I never look at it that way," Dwyer said. "You take the girls who come out at the beginning of the year and go with that. I try not to look at what might have happened if we had Jenni and Annie because they're gone."

The Raiders, who were 7-3 in dual meets and third in the Western Lakes Activities Association, do return their top gymnast of a year ago.

Sonior Mitchelle Tsai, an all-area performer who should be North's top scorer again, scored in every event at the WIAAA meet and finished cight in the all-around, but she just missed qualifying for state.

"She had a few bad breaks at the end of the year," Dwyer said, adding Tsai let a fall on bars at the regional affect the rest of her meet.

"That was a learning experience about dealing with pressure, and she got better because of it. She's stronger than last year as far as the difficulty of her routines."

The Raiders also return senior Elyse Turner, another fourth-year gymnast who will serve as co-captain

along with Tsai. She tied with Tsai for 10th on vault in the league meet.
"She's always been there, giving us high scores, and that's going to continue." Dwyer said. "One of her better events is vault, and she's pretty strong on beam as far as being consistent. She can reach the mid 8s on every event."

The Raiders enter the season with Dwyer counting on five gymnasts to form the nucleus of his team.

The others are junior Marie Pinsky and sophomers Hillary Lum and Stephanic Cohen. Lum and Pinsky return from last year, and Cohen is new to the team but has gymnastics exercitone.

Lum, who qualified for regional, and Pinsky worked out the year round and have improved their tricks, Dwyer said. Cohen has been away from the sport for 1½ years but will be a nice addition to the team once she gets her strength back, Dwyer said.

"Usually, that comes close to making it to state, so I think we have a shot." he said. "If you can score in the high 120s that's respectable. That means you have a fair amount of girls hitting high 8s, and that's the sign of a good team. I think that's about where we're going to be."

anything. We have to learn what's
important. Talent is enough to
win a lot of games, but talent nevver wins out over intelligent play."

The Shamrocks made six of seven free throws down the stretch and moved to 3-2 overall. "They put pressure on us and we knew they'd come back, get the crowd into it, but we weathered it," Holowicki said. "Smith is tough, knows what to do and how to play the angles. I think the Lakeshere loss (60-48 on Dec. 22) was good for us."

Kummer had 18 points on 5-10 shooting and he also held the University of Detroit-Merry bound Robinson to an unimpressive 17 points on 7-22 shooting.
