stretch limos. Rates range from \$40-\$80 an hour, depending on the size of the limo, which includes six, eight and 10-passenger ones. Aristocrat also has week-end rates.

In the winter, limousines may be rented by people who go skiing for the weekend up north. "They leave Friday night and return Sunday. The limo drops them off at the ski resort," she said. These kinds of rentals can be an expensive way to travel, but you go in style. Usually, it's not a big group traveling. "Last time it was just four people," Jarvis said.

Limousines also may be rented for surprise birthday parties and for anniversaries. "They will surprise somebody at work, say at GM. A lot of people will be leav-

ing, and the limo will be sitting there with the driver. The spouse will be in the car waiting," she said. Drinks, balloons, napkins and party favors will be part of the celebration.

Fiftieth wedding anniversaries may call for something special. "The kids will have a party, and send the limo to pick up the parents. They'll take the parents to the party. The limo will return to pick them up," she said. You don't have to let the limo sit and wait, running up the rental. Jarvis said "two transfers" are what is provided.

For newborns coming from the hospital, obviously it's their first limousine ride, but many grown-ups also are riding in a limo for

the first time, when the occasion is in their honor. "A lot of the older people have never been in a limo. They get a big kick out of it," Jarvis said.

Marilyn Habsburg of West Bloomfield and her sister, Suzanne Lucas of Franklin, recently rented a limo from Michigan Limousine Service of Royal Oak for their mother's 76th birthday. They took Ida Lucas of West Bloomfield on a day-long tour of Detroit and suburbs, visiting places and doing things that were meaningful in her life, Habsburg said.

Providing tickets, as well as taking customers to sporting and concert events, is a specialty offered by Continental Limousine Service of West Bloomfield.

He founded JSA Publication, Inc. to manage and market "Party Ranks." The company became a full-fledged features syndicate representing comic strips, commentary and advice columns, as well as other features. Aljouny then accepted an offer from a competing syndicate to merge JSA's distribution operations and he agreed to specialize in humor and travel.

As an agent, Aljouny represents about 120 authors and illustrators from all over the country in the areas of humor, popular culture and popular reference. Some 25 books that he represented have been published. The 35-year-old single entrepreneur also teaches a course on the business of writing for freelance writers.

Juggling roles

As if he didn't already wear enough hats, Aljouny is also the author of four travel history books, more than a dozen humor books and regularly contributes to a number of local and national publications.

As an agent, Aljouny said, "This is one business where the clients come to you."

Working at home, Aljouny said, he often puts in a lot more hours than most people. But he doesn't seem to mind the interrupting phone calls he tends to while talking to a reporter.

Specializing in humor is practi-

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cal from a business standpoint, Aljouny said.

"No one else was just developing humor books."

Of the books he's been involved in, Aljouny's favorite is "Gifts: Almost Got You." However, he said, "101 Things Not to Say During Sex" and the "Ultimate Dumb Blonde Joke Book" will probably be the best sellers.

"We've done a lot of really wonderful things that don't sell, too," Aljouny said.

As for the future, Aljouny is looking at interactive media through computers.

"Humor probably won't be a big category," he said, adding that popular references, like "776 Stupidest Things I Ever Said," will be sought.

Meanwhile, look for his titles, like "Business Maxims from Dad," "Monday Sucks" and "Celebrity Black Book," a directory of famous people.
