Big haul: Concerns by the Farmington area Goodfellows that this year's mailing campaign would not be as successful as the previous "Old Newsboy" street sale of Goodfellow papers were unfounded, said Jim Stevens, a spokesman for the group. Food, clothing, toys and other items were collected and provided to 155 families, 130 senior citizens and 148 families served by the Adopt-a-Family program. "There were more people than ever who needed help and we did it," Stevens said. The group was also helped by the U.S. Marines and their Toys for Tots campaign and more than 65 National Honor Society students from Farmington, North Farmington and Harrison high schools.

Poster contest deadline nears

The deadline is near for elementary students who wish to participate in the U.S. Treasury's third annual National Student Poster Contest.

The national contest, for students in grades 4 through 6, promotes U.S. Savings Bonds.

Last year over 30,000 students entered the contest, which is co-sponsored by Lockheed Corp. Five thousand of these entries came from Michigan students.

Brochures containing contest rules were mailed to schools in November. Entries must be submitted through schools by Jan. 14, 1994.

The 1994 contest theme is "Secure Your Future Today — Buy U.S. Savings Bonds."

The first judging level will take place in schools throughout the nation. Winners in each school will be forwarded to state coordinators for judging of top state posters.



Farmington Hills residents who qualified include: Sam Gero, Uday Gorrepati, Jeff Kessler, Chait Lingham, Sneha Medhavan and Doug Redmond. Those students take the Part II examination with the 100 top scorers invited to a banquet in February where \$30,000 in scholarship money is awarded. The Michigan Mathematics Prize Competition is sponsored annually by the Michigan Section of the Mathematical Association of America.

■ HELPING HAND

Meeting adjourned at 8:45 p.m.


