Adams, the longtime pastor of Hartford Baptist Memorial Church in Detroit, discussed the topic "Revisiting the Dream of The Rev. Dr. Marin Luther King' before a meeting of the Farmington / Farmington Hills, Multicultural / Multiracial Community Council at the Farmington Training Center.

Adams chronicled the history of racism and the continuing disparity, between the races in employment, health care, housing and school funding, He called for the need to include everyone and to find a solution to the problem.


