Hoop players leave Ladywood

Tara Overaltis, considered one of the top girls basketball players in the state, is changing her school address.

The 5-foot-10 standout confirmed reports Monday that she is leaving Livonia Ladywood Hitch.

immed reports monary that are is leaving Livonia Ladywood High.

She has been accepted as a student and will enroll early next week in Dearborn Divine Child, the 1993 state Class B girls basketball champlons.

Overaitis, who averaged points and eight rebounds per game last season, will become eligible next fall after sitting out the second semester, which begins Tuesday, at Divine Child. (Michigan High School Athlette Association rules stipulate that parochial school transfers must it out one semester before be-

Association rules stipulate that parochial school transfers must att out one semester before becoming eligible. Overalitie, a 4.0 student, is finishing up first semester finals this week at Ladywood.

The decision to change schools ends nearly a month of speculation that Overalitie was retortaining thoughts of leaving Ladywood.

The move comes on the heels of Ladywood's firing of coach Ed Kavanaugh in early December. Kavanaugh, at odds the past two years with Ladywood principal Sister Mary Ann Smith, was forced out after posting a career

"My mom called the school (Divine Child) for me, but I initiated it. My parents left the decision up to me. I wanted to transfer earlier, but I stuck it out as long as I could."

Ladywood finished a somewhat disappointing 14-4 least season, losing to Plymouth Canton in the Class A district final at Northville. The Blazers, despite winning two of three Central Division meetings with Divine Child, were upset by the Palcons in the semifinals of the Catholic League playoffs.

Overaitis, held to 14 points, suffered a broken nose in the 49-44 upset loss to DC.

"I walted another season to see how things would go," overaitis, deld to the way we all thought, I decided it was time to leave. I had thought about it for awhile."

Kavanaugh's firing, which stemmed from disagreements with Ladywood administrators over access to the school's newly constructed gymnasium, cemented Overaitis' decision to transfer. Kavanaugh's replacement is expected to be named later this month.

"That kind of put the final touch and an end to it," Overaitis said. "It made my decision to transfer more firm."
