

Falcons look like contenders, too

Farmington Hills Harrison isn't the only city team playing good volleyball.

Farmington High is doing well, too, and was 2-0 in the Western Lakes Activities Association prior to a Wednesday match with Livonia Churchill.

The Falcons defeated visiting Plymouth Canton in three games Monday (6-8-8) to stay unbeaten in the league, coming from behind to win the last two games. Farmington (5-7-4) was down 9-2 in the third.

"Usually, we're not a team that shows a lot of emotion," Farmington coach Julie Ingalls said. "But the girls were real pleased with three wins in a row."

"They were happy with the way things went and want to keep it going. They realized it's OK to win three games in a row. Our enthusiasm and concentration were just great."

Ingalls pointed to the fact Farmington missed only five hits and served seven aces as being key factors in the match.

Maggie Frump was 13-of-16 attacking and Krissy Mahon 7-of-7. Each had one kill. Laura McWilliam had just four hits (two kills), but they came at key times in the match, Ingalls said.

Mahon also was 15-of-17 serving with 12 points and two aces, Natalie Kocera 13-of-14 with 11 points, including eight straight in the second game, and one ace. Jessica Gubard had seven digs and was solid on serve receive.

"Our serves were strong, so they couldn't get their offense going as much as they would have liked," Ingalls said. "Canton is a team that can hit. They hit cross-court

short a lot, and the front-row defense was good about getting back and covering."

Hawks down Patriots

Harrison improved to 4-0 in the WLAA and 21-2-4 overall with a three-game victory (7-11-3) over upstart Livonia Franklin, which played without setter Lenay Truchan, who had the chicken pox.

"I was really concerned about Franklin, because they've been playing well," Harrison coach Ron Shortt said. "We refocused after losing to Salem (in the Plymouth tournament Saturday) and reminded ourselves 'We're division champs and this is a team we have to beat.' We talked about what we needed to do, and the kids responded well."

The Hawks trailed 9-1 in the second game, but Lori Hubble served points three through 13 to put Harrison in front.

"Our kids are real good about coming back and never getting down when they're behind," Shortt said. "I think they have more confidence in themselves than I do at times. It never fazes them; they just keep moving along."

Amanda Ault had 11 kills and 26 attacks, Carey Perkins five and 14. Hubble also had six of the team's 11 digs. Ault had 15 assists out of 34 sets, Maggie Chavez 10 out of 36.

"We didn't pass the ball as well as we wanted," Shortt said, "but Mo did an absolutely great job of getting to a lot of hard-to-reach

passes and setting them up for somebody to hit."

Krista Snow had two solo blocks and two assists, Jenny Myslinski three assists, Chavez and Perkins two assists apiece.

In pool play Saturday, the Hawks defeated Canton (13-11) and Dearborn Heights Crestwood (11-12) and split with Westland John Glenn (15-11, 11-16).

They best Crestwood again in the quarterfinals (7-12), but Salem was too overpowering in the semis and won by consecutive 15-2 scores.

"We played our standard game (as far as number of attacks), but we couldn't put anything down against them," Shortt said. "They hit everything and sent us back, reeling."

"We weren't doing anything wrong; they weren't making any mistakes. They just played an excellent game."

Ault had six kills and 19 attacks against Canton, seven kills and 13 attacks in the Glenn match. But the Hawks were limited to just four kills out of 40 attacks by Salem.

Marlins fall in 3

Harper Woods' Regina edged host Farmington Hills Mercy 17-15 in the third game Monday to keep the Marlins winless (0-5) in the Central Division. Mercy won the first 15-13 but lost the second 11-15.

"Our serving was much more consistent," Mercy coach Peggy Spengler said, "until the final game when we ran out of rotations and had a lot of big girls, who don't normally serve, in the back row."

The Marlins were up 13-6 in the last game, but Regina served five aces in a row to get back in it. The Marlins missed three straight serves in row and gave the momentum to the visitors.

"When we hit the ball, we really hit it well," Spengler said. "We had some trouble against some of their servers and that hurt us."

Christiane Grant had 14 kills and 31 attacks, Jameson Emerson and Mitzi Ruddock six each. Heather Grieb had eight tip kills and 25 assists out of 59 sets.

Kathy Minteravich served aces on six of her 14 serves. Ruddock had four aces and Grant five stuff blocks.

Shelly Sills had 10 kills and two blocks for Salem. Karen Gundry seven kills and eight digs, Jamey Vinu six kills, 13 digs and three aces.
