John Ponke, a younger brother of the accused, recounted a conversation at the Rustic Pub in Farmington Dec. 30 when Raymond Ponke said he would not go through a divorce.

"He said, 'It's going to be until death do us part,'" John Ponke said during the exam. "Ray was a man of his word."

John Ponke said these threats and other irrational behavoir — including sledgehammering the inside of the family's Oxford home for 10 hours — led them to believe their brother needed help.

They had talked about having him committed to a psychiatric facility.

Nicholas Ponke testified he heard his brother making threats

two days prior to the murder dur-ing a card game. The next day, Jan. 7, Nicholas Ponke said his brother received divorce papers and a restraining order.

"And I told him, 'It becomes different now,'" Nicholas Ponke said. "I told him any irrational act, he could go to jail."

Ponke's attorney, Tim Ash, asked Nicholas Ponke about the family's history of Huntington's disease, an hereditary allment that leads to dementia.

Ash said he'll ask that his client be referred for forensic testing. He'll also ask that Raymond Ponke be tested for Huntington's.

"I think it's quite clear Raymond Ponke is insane," said Ash.

A free fingerprinting program is available from the Independent Order of Foresters for the children and grandchildren of Livonia


