Azenberg, who has choreo-graphed several productions for Michigan Opera Theatre, has directed and choreographed for Off-Broadway, regional, and stock theaters, as well as symphony orchestras and opera companies. "I think any discrimination against women is mostly uncon-scious," Acenberg said. "Men simply feel more comfortable working with men, and men run the theaters and hire the direc-tors.

Like other directors, Azenberg said she faces the challenge of being assertive without being shrewish and must go through the "courting process" with the actors

shrewish and must go through the "courting process" with the actors to prove herself to them. Neufeld has extensive stage manager credits with Broadway and OIP-Broadway shows and has also worked as a production man-ager, director and associate pro-tucer. "I don't think the theater has the glass ceiling that confronts

women in big business," Neufeld said. "Theater people are traditionally more liberal and take society's ideas to heart carlier. Theaters today operate more on ability, which puts us a tiny step shead of the rest of society." Neufeld got her first stage manager job in the early 1970s when the public theater in New York was doing a rock musical about women's liberation. She challenged the producer, Joseph Papp, to hire a woman. "Another time I got the job when a British director requested a woman stage manager because he felt women had more 'soul."

That's a lot of hoosy, but at least I got the Job," she said.
"Personally, I enjoy hiring both men and women as my assistants." Neufeld said. "Each can relate to the cast in different ways."
Neufeld also said that women stage managers really predominate in regional theaters. While they are still a decided minority on Broadway productions, their number is slowly growing.


