While the statutory plan in-creases the state income rate from 4.6 to 6 percent, the plan also in-creases the personal exemption from \$2,100 to \$3,000 (and up to \$3,900 for senior citizens), lessen-ing the impact on low- and mid-die-income individuals and fami-lies.

UAW-CAP said Proposal A would place an unfair burden on senior citizens living on a fixed income.

"The ballot plan would raise a projected \$425 million from the real estate transfer tax. But the highly cyclical nature of the real estate market makes such a tax an unstable source of funding for Michigan's schools," said UAW vice president Ernest Lofton.
