Gaul sets hurdles record

Furis State University junior Shelli Gaul
won the women's 55-meter hurdies Saturday in the Great Lakes Intercollegiato Athletic Conference indoor champlonships at Saginaw Valley State University.

The former Farmington High athletic standout set a school and GLIAC record with her 8:23 time, edging Saginaw Valley's Kim Aubert (8:29) for first place. The old record of 8:0 was set four years ago by Ferris State's Myrtis Hymon.
With that time, Gaul becomes a provisional qualifier for the NCAA II meet March 11:12 at North Dakota State. Her time will be reviewed later for consideration.

Gaul also placed fifth in the triple jump (33 feet, 9 linches) and sixth in the 55-meter dash (7.47 seconds) at the conference championships.
Ferris State won the five-team meet with 78 points followed by Hillsdale (68), Saginaw Valley (68), Crand Valley State University (35) and Northwood Institute (0).


Area golfers win pro-am

This has been and could still be a year of firsts for the Farmington boys basketball team. The Falcons qualified for the Western Lakes playoffs for the first time, made the final for the first time and could win their first championship Friday.

Farmington High had a plan to offset Northvillo's height advantage on the basketball court Tuesday, and the Falcons could not have been more pleased with the results.

In the Western Lakes Activities Association playoffs for the first time, Farmington advanced to the final with a 61-53 victory over the visiting Mustangs.

The Falcons will play Plymouth Canton for the championship 7:30 p.m. Friday at Northville, Both teams are 13-6.

"This is probably the biggest win since we've been here," Farmington coach Denny Mikel said. "It's a great win and the kids are all excited about (boing in the final)."

Canton defeated the Felcons 88-67 earlier in the season and Plymouth Salem 68-52 in the other semifinal Tuesday.
"I think we're quick, but Canton might be the quickest team in the conference," Mikel said. "We'll have to play our beat game of the season to beat them, although I like the way we're playing now."

Farmington, the smaller, quicker team, forced the Mustangs out of their zone defense and were able to get inside against their taller opponents for good shots.

That often resulted in the Falcons going to the free throw line where they actually won the game. Farmington sank 20 of 26, the Mustangs four of 10.
"We wanted to get them to match

up and play us man-to-man," Mikel
said. "If we could do that, we thought

our quickness would really kick in and we would have an advantage.

"If they played man, we would have to rely on our outside shooting. I didn't want to sit outside and shoot threes all day. We wanted to attack the basket. The Falcons used a delay game at mideourt, passing and dribbling until the Northville defenders come out to challenge them. That usually left the middle open for Stan Lewis or Scott Menser to drive to the basket.

Menser scored 17 points to lead Farmington, and Lewis got most of his 14 at the free throw line where he made 10 of 13.

Mike Tokar had 11 points (all in the second half) to go with 10 rebounds. Steve Juncaj gave the Falcons a jump-start with ejht of his 10 points (two threes) in the first quarter, and Kevin Afflerbaugh added seven points.

"Stan is the middle man on our press breaker and our zone offense," Mikel said, "We tell him to face up and attack the basket or kick it outside to the wing for a shot. He's kind of our sparkplug."

Six-foot-10 center Josh Williams had 17 points for Northville (12-7), but no one else reached double figures. John Farrar had seven, Chuck Apligian and John Buser six apiece.

"It think their stalling tactic was the biggest factor," Northville coach Larry Taylor said. "I don't think their quickness hurt us as much as their holding the ball and waiting for us to

Falcons headed to state

The wrestling season will continue two more weeks for Farmington High senior Mike Prough and sophomer Mat Michaleki.
They earned the opportunity to compete in the state finals March 11-12 by qualifying Saturday in the Class A regional tournament at South Lyon.

Prough (34-6) recorded three straight decisions to win the 140-pound champlonship, and Michalski (33-7) was the 103 runner up after losing a controversial match in the finals.

Prough, who hopes to become the first Farmington, state champions since Mark Churella in 1976, surprised himself by adding the regional title to list of successes.

"I didn't expect to win it, but things fell into place," he said, adding he didn't wrestle to the best of his ability.

"It was one of the tougher regionals, and I didn't think I could win it with the kid from Bedford, who won the other district. I wanted to qualify and make it to state, and the next thing I know I was in the final."

Prough injured his right shoulder in the district, but he said it didn't bother him Saturday and wasn't a factor in his performance even though he hadn't practiced all week.
