An unlikely bus accident caused several minor injuries and damaged four vehicles March 4.

A SMART bus heading south on Middlebelt south of 13 Mile in Farmington Hills had stopped for traffic at about 8:20 a.m. when it was rear-ended — by another SMART bus.

The collision caused the front bus to lurch shead into the car in front of it, which did the same to the car in front of it. Six people, including three of the four drivers were slightly injured.
