The OU Board of Trustees Thursdey approved the formation of a Political Action Committee empowered to collect money to be spent on helping the university pursue its goals.

The measure approved Thursday also stipulates OU would not object to any effort by friends and supporters of the university forming another PAC, second PAC could solicit contributions from alumne and friends of the university whereas OU's could only solicit from its officers, directors, administrators, professional employees and their spouses.

Neither PAC could solicit cor-porate contributions. Further-

more each must function and operate independently of OU itself.
"Forming a PAC (or PACs) will bring OU into the 21st century," said OU board chairman James A. Sharp Jr. "Other universities have had PACs for years."
Six of the 13 state universities in Michigan currently have PACs under the Michigan Campaign Finance Act. Those PACs gather money to be used for lobbying efforts or to make campaign contributions to favorite candidates.

PACs are believed to be somewhat helpful, for example, in helping universities get larger hudgets from the state Legislature. PACs can also make contributions to favored legislators who are believed to be more understanding or sympathetic of the university's goals.

Once formed, OU's PAC must restrict solicitations to officers and directors of the university, or to administrative and professional employees and their spouses.

It could not solicit corporate contributions.

Trustee Andrea L. Fischer of Birmingham said there is no particular reason OU is forming a PAC at this time. "But there's nothing unusual about it. My law. firm, for example, also has a PAC. It helps us support the causes or candidates that we think are important."

While there is no stated purpose, for which OU endorses the formation of a PAC, the university.
