In the future, health insurers may require CARF accreditation for reimbursement to assure that rehabilitation facilities meet standards of care and that money spent on rehabilitation is used effectively.

CARF's evaluation of Botsford included looking at the quality and training of the staff of the unit, measured success in treating patients, its operations, the level of involvement of patients in their rehabilitation and the layout of the facilities for accessibility to those with disabilities, among other criteria.

Botsford Genral Hospital is a 336-bed osteopathic teaching hospital serving Farmington Hills and surrounding communities.
