Medicines, household substances, insect sprays, furniture polishes, traints and solvents are most frequently the cause of acci-

dental poisoning among children.
Also, household and garden plants can cause plant poisoning in children.

Syrup of ipecac is essential in treating some poisoning.
"It's essential for enyone with children under 6 years old to have syrup of ipecac," according to a Children's Hospital of Michigan spokeswoman.

"But you should call your poison control center or doctor before using it, because ther are some substances, like bleach, that you would not want them to throw up," she added.

Household products should be stored away from food and medications. Death from accidental poisoning could be the result of a mistaken identity.

Never leave a cleaning product or medication in sight, even to answer the phone or doorbell. Remember Children act fast.
