Chastity is best policy, she says

The topic was sex at several
area high schools Tuesday and
Wednesday as a 55-year-old
mother of eight encouraged kids
to consider the virtues of chastity.
Molly Kelly flew in from Philadelphia, her airfare paid by tocal
parents and schools, to repeat the
message she has relayed to teenagers for 10 years.
On Tuesday she spoke to 900
kids at Redford Thurston High
School, 1,100 kids at Redford
Union High School and about 250
kids at Seaholm High School in
Birmingham. Wednesday she
went to Lahser and Detroit Country Day.

The Seaholm crowd was rela-tively small because the whole student body wasn't there. Only the students in health classes

were compelled to attend.

To some people, Kelly said, safe sex is just a cuphemism for contraception. But Kelly prefers the term "saved sex," meaning sex a person didn't have, but saved for the future.

Her main concern is that casual sex can have serious side offects, like prepaneny and disease. But Kelly parts company with the safe sex crowd when she notes that birth control devices are fallible and there's no reason why chastity shouldn't be presented as an option.

Noting that condoms fail 10-20 percent of the time, Kelly asked the rhetorical question, "Would I give my ear to a kid if the steering wheel locks 10 percent of the

time?" On basketball player Ervin

Magic Johnson — who is HIV po-sitve — Kelly wondered what he would have said if the woman he was about to have intercourse with confessed to having AIDS. "Do you really think he would have said, 'Not to worry, I've got my condom,' "she said. Kelly also noted that teenagers are getting mixed messages on sex, alcohol and drugs. With the latter two, the message is simply, don't do it. With sex the message seems to he, "Here's a condom, here's a birth control pill. Be care-ful."

Applying the message regarding sex to the drug situation, Kelly said, would result in something like this: "Don't take drugs, but if you're going to do it anyway, meet me over by the door and I'll give you a clean needle." you a clean needle."

A few Seaholm students cor-

ralled at the end of Kelly's one-woman show said they liked what she said.

"It's a good message," said Lloyd Abramson. "You never see this message brought out."

"She had a lot of good ideas I hadn't thought about before," said Denny Lugar.

"It's nice to see an assembly on something controversial that you can't get diseases from," said Micah Brown, recalling past lectures on homosexuality and AIDS.
"She has a good point of view that the students can relate to," said Joe Srock. "I thought she was excellent."

Kelly said that her travails were made worthwhile when a girl approached her after the speech. "She took my hand and said, 'You made my day."
