has volunteered himself and the
resources of Oakland County government to aid Detroit Mayor
Dennis Archer on spring cleaning
day, Saturday, April 23.

Detroit officials have given

Patterson, and whoever he can convince to help, the responsibility for cleaning the area bordered by Eight Mile Road, Telegraph, Seven Mile Road and Evergeen.

Dave Ross, the director of public works for Oakland County, toured the area on Wednesday, March 16, with Detroit officials to see just how big the job is.

Parts of it are relatively nice, he said, but "there are a couple of pockets of areas that are really

trashed up."
For example, one street Ross anw contained abandoned couches, mattresses and a burned out car. Discarded thres are all over the place.
Patterson, in a letter to Osk-land County's 61 municipal governments, has asked for help in cleaning his section of Detroit. "I think it's feasible for us to line up a minimum of 61 trucks and crews, possibly one from each

community, and to work in De-troit on that Saturday in a volun-teer capacity. Patterson said in the letter. "It would send a power-ful message back and forth across Eight Mile, a message that is long overdue that we are in this region together, for better and for worse, and why not make it for the bet-ter."

Noting that "many of us, cer-tainly yours truly, have had a less than perfect working relationship

with the previous administration in the city of Detroit," Patterson went on to predict "a bright new era" for Detroit under Archer. The kind of equipment they need the most for clean-up day, Patterson said, in order of prefer-ence, are garbage trucks, dump trucks, stake trucks and front-end londers.

Ross said none of the trash col-lected in Detroit will be dumped in Oakland County.
