Three school record holders is a good place to start when assessing the outlook for the North Farmington girls track team in 1994.

The Raiders had a successful season last year, and senior Keedover, junior Allaha Gordon and sophomore Heather Burcar were reasons why North was co-champion of the West Bloomfield regional.

Gordon was primarily a hurdler at the start of last acason, but she also was one of Observerland's top throwers by the end of it.

She shares the record in the 1900-meter hurdles (16.5) and placed sixth in the Western Lakes Activities Association, but she made the all-area second team in the shot put.

Keefover holds the record in the 800 run (2:23.8) and was second in the WIAA. She is also one of North's top discus throwers with a personal beat of 10:39.

Burcar was the regional champion and placed third in the WIAA in the 400 dash, and showns the record in that event at 53.4. She also placed fourth at the team's top long jumper.
