No More Cheap Envelopes

Good news to the print shops is the announcement from Postmaster General Hitchcock that from now on the government will not print stamped envelopes and it is recommended that the same be done by local newspapers in every town where there is a newspaper having a special permit for the town or be nearest newspaper where there is no paper of its own. The large town will be allowed to have a monopoly on the printing to the detriment of smaller newspapers.

A uniform scale of printing will be prepared by the postoffice department and insisted upon so that newspapers will not be sold stamped envelopes for printing. The department has also made a ruling that no first class mail will be allowed transmission through mails unless it has a return address written or printed thereon. This above means that the envelope business will take on a magnificent boom this year that is sure to continue.
