But all is not lost.

The Michigan Department of Natural Resources has anounced that 1,189 left-over spring wild turkey permits are available. The left-over permits go on sale tomorrow on a first-come, first-serve basis at DNR district offices.

The permits may be picked up in person or by mail. Walk-in requests will be filled first and mail-in requests will be filled at the end of each day as long as per-

mits are available.
Over 600 parmits are restricted
to private land use in the south/
central portion of the southern
Lower Peninsula. The Jackson
district office (517-780-7900) will
issue 591 private land permits,
the Shiswassee district office
(517-625-6400) will issue six permits and another 47 are available
at the Plainwell district office
(616-685-6851).

In the Upper Peninsula, 340 general licenses are available at the Escanaba district office (906-878-2551) and 205 general licenses are available at the Crystal Falls district office (906-878-6622).
