The sign is on the northwest corner of Farm-ington and Grand River. The sign tells people they're in front of the historic Masonic Temple. The marker carries a different mes-sage for the Farmington Downtown Development Authority: Listen to the

"When we have that 'Eat at Joe's' aign, we're saying Hicksville USA." said Farmington resident Gary Philips during the meeting.

Board members agreed to reconsider the \$3,000 marker sometime after the aummer. That way, people will be able to see how it fits with the flowers and other landscaping at the corner.

"I think we're at a point and time, we have to see it through," said DDA board member Robert Heinrich, "Bad go back and see, not just the sign, but everything that has been done there."

Also, the board agreed to correct

A monthly DDA newsletter will be sent out and there will be quarterly forums for residents and business people to air opinions. The sign remained a focal point, though, especially during the public comment segment of the meeting. it was a unanimous verdict: The 47th District Court will not be getting a third judge.

The court had hoped to win approval for the third judgeship from the state Senate Judiciary Committee Wednesday, but did not. It was the

second time a third judgeship had been recommended and included in the budget, and the second time it had been turfied down.

The five-member panel turned down the request, 3-0, with two members absent, after hearing teatimony from court administrators in syveral courts, including the 47th, which takes in Farmington and Farmington
