HERITAGE PARK SHELTER

At the Department of Special Services office, Farmington Hills residents, in person, may reserve one of the three shelters within Heritage Park. SOFTBALL REGISTRATION

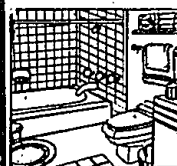

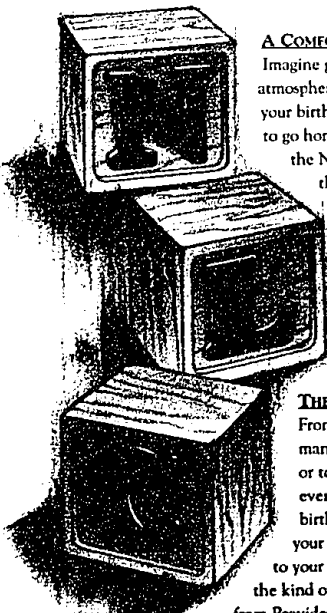
