North goalkeeper Stephanic Stiegler had to make only one save in the first half, making a two-handed catch of a Carey Perkins free kick with five minutes left.

But the Raiders, despite their early pressure, didn't pepper the Harrison goal either as Sara Kloosterman made two first-half saves in goal for the Hawks.

Harrison, with a strong wind at its back in the second half, began the last 40 minutes toding what the Raiders did not the start of the game.

Though they had the ball in the North end for nearly 10 minutes, the Hawks were unable to capitalize on the situation.

"In the beginning, we played defensive, defensive soccer and we weren't going to the ball early on," Harrison canch Glenn Breuban said. "During that stretch of the second half, we wanted it, but we didn't have any forwards running on to it — and that's something we have to work on.
