2015 Regional Transportation Plan for Southeast Michigan and the Transportation Improvement Program (FY 1994-1996) Amendments

The public is invited to review and submit comments on amendments to the 2015 Regional Transportation Plan for Southeast Michigan (RTP) and the Fixed Year (FV) 1994-1996 Transportation Improvement Program (TTP) during the public comment period, April 25 to June 9, 1994. The RTP and the TIP are listings of federally and non-federally funded major road and transit service improvements proposed by various communities, road agencies, transit agencies and the Michigan Department of Transportation. The Federal Intermodal Surface Transportation Efficiency Act (ISTEA) emphasizes the public's opportunity to review and comment on road and transit projects proposed for federal funding. This public comment process is part of SIEMCOG's overall responsibility for formulating the RTP and the TIP, and for approving projects for federal funding.

The additional projects are located in the Southeast Michigan counties of Livingston, Macomb, Monroe, Oakland and Wayne. The types of proposed projects include construction of new roads, widening of exist-

interchanges and the construction of a new freeway
interchange. The TIP document identifies the location
of each project, estimated cost, the source of funds and
the agency or community which has jurisdiction over
the project.

Condo president says he took bath on sewer bill

The president of Longacre Woods Condominiums likes to keep the lawn watered — but he didn't expect to get soaked with a

didn't expect to get soaked with a \$772 sewer bill.
Frank Milo, president of the condominiums near Arundel Street, complained to the Farmington City Council at the April 18 meeting about the charges. Milo has already paid the bill.
Milo would like to be billed for water usage only, and thought that would be the case when he installed a separate meter to tabulate irrigation use only. Most of the water usade dup by soll with very little — if any —

going into storm sewers, he said.

"We assumed we would be paying for water only — we didn't expect the sewer charge." Milo said.

The city of Farmington, like a majority of Oakland County communities, doesn't bill water customers separately. Whether it runs into a bathub or through a garden hose, residents are charged for both water and sewer usage.

Milo's situation, though, unpluys another quirk.

The property crosses the boundary between Farmington and Farmington Hills. Though the water is provided by the city of Farmington, atorm sewers in Farmington Hills are used to handle runoff from the complex.

Green Briars on Drake Road has a similar arrangement.
What to do? That's the pickle. City Manager Frank Lauhoff said he was told by the city attorney the city ordinance doeant' allow for exceptions in such cases. Water and sewer are dependent on revenue generated. Any reduced charges mean a loss in revenue, which would result in increased sewer coats to all users. "Your property is truly unique," and counciliams William Hartsock. "The question is how can we accommodate the uniqueness of the situation... and the billing mechanism we have.
"At the moment, I don't have an answer."
