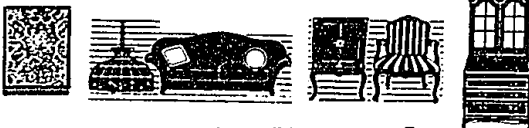

Use caution to close door on scam artists

The Farmington Hills Police Department has responded to complaints recently from seniors adults who have allowed individuals into their homes under false pretenses and then fallen victim to theft. These individuals distracted the seniors or asked for sensitive financial information, such as bank account numbers, and stole hard-earned cash from them.

While people over age 65 make up only 12 percent of the population, they constitute about 30 percent of scam victims. Often the victims of such plays are older women, but con artists will try their tactics on anyone.

When someone comes to your door offering you some product or service do not open the door until you are convinced that they are legitimate.

Always check identification before opening your door. Do not allow entry into your home unless it is absolutely necessary. Ask for proof of association with a charity, such as a company identification card with a photograph of the person. Check the image on the ID card with the face you see in front of you to see if this is the person pictured.

If you still feel uncertain, look up the company's telephone number and call to verify the employment of the individual, asking if the person has legitimate business at your home. If not, turn him/her away.

Always write a check, rather than giving cash, for charitable contributions or purchases from a fund-raising organization. Always make out checks only to the organization name, never to an individual who is collecting for the group.

Do not leave purses, wallets, or checkbooks in places where visitors may find them. Always report suspicious people or circumstances to the police immediately — don't be embarrassed or

ashamed — these guys are pros.

Don't allow a salesperson to rush you into making a decision, to spend money, and/or take a deposit or payment from you. Take your time to think about financial commitments, investigate the company before signing a contract. Talk the offer over with someone you trust before making any commitment.

Never give your bank account number or credit card number to someone who calls you on the phone or comes to your door. Avoid discussing your personal finances with strangers. Testify in court, if asked, to help stop this kind of crime.

Make sure that your home is secure. Residential security surveys are available free to residents of Farmington Hills in which recommendations are made for low-cost measures that can make your home more secure.

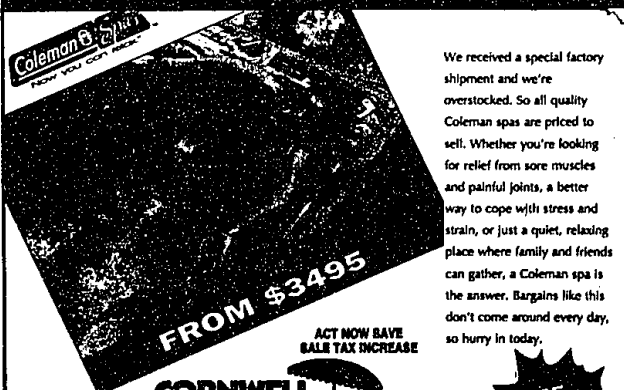
