Concern for the beauty and vibrancy of Birmingham has continued over the years, Local artists foan sculptures for display in public areas. Downtown Birmingham has a theater that brings touring Broadway shows, over 40 art galleries, over 120 unique stores and over 30 fine restaurants. Downtown Shain Park hosts art fairs, music concerts, festivals, and on occasion political rallies. In 1991, First Night/ Birmingham was developed as a family-oriented non-alcoholic way to celebrate the New Year "intoxicated with the pleasure of the arts" rather than alcohol.

Birmingham is an attractive, cultural city that provides its approximately 20,000 residents with opportunities to live, shop and play within the city's boundaries. It has a variety of housing styles and housing costs cover a relatively broad price range which provides a thriving community for many
