FARMINGTON/FARMINGTON HILLS

In many ways Farmington and Farmington Hills are separate parts of a single entity. For most of its 165-year history, the City of Farmington has been the retail center for the surrounding farming community, and later the surrounding suburban community known as Farmington Township. As the township grew there was much debate about what the civic relationship between the two should be—one city or two. Farmington

Township resolved the issue in 1973, by incorporating as the City of Farmington Hills. Today Farmington Hills has both the greater land area and the larger population with approximately 75,000 residents compared to Farmington's population of approximately 10,000 residents in its two and one-half square mile area. Both cities place a high value on their common heritage and tradition.

In 1827, the Territorial Legislature established Farmington as one of five townships in what is today Oakland County. Three modern roads—Shiawassee, Grand River and Orchard Lake—get their names and general paths from the ancient Indian trails that met here in Farmington Township, then separated heading north and west.

The first settlers were Arthur Power and four fellow Quakers from
