

# CC bounces back with pair of wins

The Bedford Catholic Central lacrosse team rebounded from a 6-2 loss on Thursday, April 21, with a pair of wins over the weekend.

The Shamrocks on Saturday defeated host Troy, 8-3, after posting a 4-0 halftime lead. CU won again Sunday, getting a goal from senior attacker Matt Griffin in the second minute of overtime to beat Worthington (Ohio), 6-5.

The Shamrocks are 7-2 overall. Senior Jeff Lachapelle scored two goals and one assist and Griffin and Jason Hubenschmidt contributed two goals each against Troy. Matt McViney and Mike Avey added one goal each.

Senior Matt Sokolowski was the goalkeeper for 2 1/4 quarters, allowing no goals. Alex Alviar played the rest of the way in net, allowing the three Troy goals.

Griffin scored a goal at 1:48 of sudden death OT to defeat Worthington in a non-league

game. The Shamrocks lost the opening face-off of the extra session. Alviar made a save on a Worthington shot and sent an outlet pass to Hubenschmidt, who passed the ball ahead to Griffin.

Griffin made the winning shot from the left slot.

"It was just like we draw it up," CC coach Jim Ryan joked. Chris Gonzalez scored two goals. Hubenschmidt, Avey and Chris Teller scored one goal each.

The victories helped erase the memories of the loss to Cranbrook days earlier. Cranbrook jumped ahead early on CC and held on with a conservative game plan.

"We had quite a substantial letdown (after wins against University of Detroit-Desautel and Detroit Country Day)," Ryan said. "We got down and Cranbrook's the type of team that they'll get a lead and hold the ball all day."

WHY? She finished her college career at Ferris State University as three-time winner of the most-valuable summer award and the year added the most improved award.

Here's a list of her accomplishments.

■ Holds Ferra State records in the 200-meter freestyle (1:54.97), 500 freestyle (5:08.25), 1,500 freestyle (18:03.68), 100 butterfly (1:00.6) and 200 butterfly (2:29.28).

■ Made the Ferra State all-time best lists (top 10 times) in the 50, 100, 200, 500, 1,000 and 1,500 freestyles and 100 and 200 butterflies.

■ Was the Great Lakes Intercollegiate Athletic Conference 200 butterfly champion in 1993 and was a four-time all-GUAC performer in that event. Was a GUAC finalist in the 200 and 500 freestyles and the 100 and 200 butterflies.

■ Was a member of Ferra State record-setting relay teams in the 200 and 400 medleys and 200 and 400 freestyles.

■ Contributed to Ferra State winning academic All-America honors as a junior with a 3.6 grade point average in education.

■ Earned performance All-America honors in the 200 butterfly as a junior and senior, the 200, 500 and 1,500 freestyle as a senior.

■ Qualified for the NCAA Division III national championships in four events this year and placed 10th in the 200 free, fourth, 500 free, 12th, 200 fly, and 13th, 1,500 free. Was sixth in the 200 fly as a junior.

■ Was one of six women swimmers inducted into the Ferra State Hall of Champions this year.

her at North Farmington, to give her the proper focus.

"He always seems to say the right things," she said. "He's a great motivator."

"When I was in high school, he couldn't concentrate on me as much because he had to worry about everybody, but when he came up here to watch a meet, he could. It was great to see him proud of me."

Duthie is among the fortunate ones who finished her career at the right time, because Ferris State has decided to drop women's swimming as well as some men's sports as a cost-cutting measure.

She considered transferring to another school when Ferris State talked about eliminating swim-

ming in her sophomore year and has strong feelings about the decision.

"I don't think it's fair we were the only women's sport cut," she said. "Of course, they're going to keep football and hockey, and

when they get to a little, itty-bitty sport like swimming it seems we're discriminated against. It does take money to keep the pool running, but as far as I know they're not going to drain it."

"I don't see any people making the decisions at swim meets. I see them at football and hockey games, and they're going to keep those because those are the sports they enjoy. It's very frustrating more couldn't have been done about it."

Duthie, who has a major in business education and minor in social studies, will do her student teaching next fall at Harrison High School and graduate in December. She hopes to remain in the Farmington area as a teacher and swim coach.
