"Certain people who are currently allowed to be in corrections
centers or half-way house prior
to parole would not be eligible for
that until after perole," said Sen.
Jack Welborn, R.-Kalamatoo, one

"People want to vote on being tough on prisoners and criminals on a big television day," Welborn said, "but I think it is a mistake

to pass legislation that is going to undermine some of the alternative programs we put forth." But the sponsor, Sen. William Van Regemmorter, R-Jenison, said the cost of letting prisoners go free too soon exceeds, immeasurably, the cost of keeping them behind bars until their minimum sentences have been served.
"The minute that 15-year person welks into the front door at Jackson prison," he said, "that sentence is going to be reduced to about 11.5 years for good time—it really doesn't matter whether you carn it or not."
