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Waste of money?

Critics: Arena plan costs cold cash

It wasn't on the agenda, but a proposed multi-purpose ice arena was not left out of Monday's regu-lar Farmington Hills City Council

lar Farmington Hills City Council
meeting.
During public comments and
questions two residents came forward to oppose not only the proposal, but any further spending
on studying it.
"There are a lot of ice arenas
around," asid Richard Lytwyniuk. "This is going to cost high
bucks."

bucks."
Lytwyniuk and Harris Mc-Bride, who before has said he op-poses the project, said even pay-ing for architectural drawings of the proposed arena would be money wasted.

Mayor, Larry, Lichtman, called

Mayor Larry Lichtman called Lytwyniuk's figure of \$40,000 to pay for plans wrong. He also chided Lytwyniuk for his sarcasm

and inferences that council mem-bers had done anything "seedy" in the process of proposing the

"I don't know where you've got-ten that number from," Lichtman

ten that number from," Lichtman said.
City manager Bill Costick said the city had not yet authorized any money for plans but added that he expected those plans, if authorized by the council, to cost between \$5,000 and \$8,000.
Councilman Terry Sever offered to sit down with Lytwyniuk and convince him of the project's ability to make money for the city over time. Sever, along with other council members, also defended the use of money already spent on a market study and money that will likely be spent on architectural drawings. By spending some money to study the project, the city could better plan an arena and save money in the long run.

Sever said.
In other action, the council:
Heard a breakdown of the fire department's annual report from Fire Chief Richard Marinucci.

department's annual report from Fire Chief Richard Marinucci.

Despite a decrease in fires, in part credited to the department's fire prevention efforts, emergencies handled by the department were up by 12 percent overall in 1933, Marinucci said. That trend is likely to continue, with more medical calls because of a growing and aging population.

As requested by councilman Aldo Vagnozi, Marinucci provided a breakdown in response time that showed the departmentwide average response time (4.74 minotes), response times for the duty crews and paid-on-call crews for each station.

The duty crews are all averaging under four minutes, with Station 1 at 3.82 minutes, Station 2 at 3.06 minutes, Station 3 at 3.29

minutes and Station 4 at 3,56 minutes. On-call response pulled up the averages with times from 6.9 minutes for Station 1 to 4.5 minutes for Station 1 to 4.5 minutes for Station 3. The closeness of peid-on-call freelighters to the fire stations and the area covered had a lot to with those response times, Marinucci said.
