## Hills budget proposal: Drain fund balance

The proposed budget for Farmington Hills will increase by 1.3 percent, but it will further drain the city's fund balance.

City Manager Bill Costick discussed a preliminary city budget during a study seasion with the Farmington Hills City Council Monday.

"Last year we used some of the fund balance to balance our budget," Costick said. "This year we're going to use almost all of it. We're getting thinner and thinner.

A combination of factors ac-

counts for the increase of \$545.625 in the proposed 1994-95 budget that will total \$30,3945. Part of the problem is less money in some area. "Our ordinance violations have heen down for the last year," said Charles Rosch, director of finance.

Building and other fees were also down and the money the city saved in recycling costs will be re-flected in lower bills to residents, Costick said.

Another factor increasing costs was a 48.4 percent increase in

workers compensation costs over the past two years. In part be-cause of a new way those costs are figured. Fire department runs, mostly medical, also increased by

mostly medical, also increased by 12 percent, driving up paid-on-call and overtime costs. "We've always been lucky about projecting where we would be," Costick said, adding that he had not anticipated the dramatic increase in fire department runs. The budget proposal also in-cludes \$175.200 in new services, including \$43,700 to cover in-creased library hours (Sunday) at the Farmington library branch

and the addition of a librarian. A part-time zoning inspector position (324,500) and part-time subpona serve (43,000) would probably be offset by money they would generate for the city. The budget also includes \$50,000 for work mointenance, \$33,000 to cover more paid call-back firefighting runs and \$15,000 for public relations.

The city will also pay more for its pension fund to cover a higher benefit for retirees, he said. The council will begin more detailed work on the budget in the coming weeks.
