child, so they embark on their journey into the scary woods with mixed anticipation. "It Takes Two" is sung beautifully by Ed-wards and Mough; only together can they get through the woods. Edwards facial expressions, at turns comic or morose, tell his story well.

Little Red Riding Hood is performed with A plus energy by talented Rebecca Bahling. Ron Williams is terrific as the Wolf as he sings with sexy and lustful glee, "There's no possible way to describe what you feel when you're talking to your meal."

Williams also doubles as Cinderella's Frince. With Matt Draving as Rapunze's Frince, the two sing a very comical "Agony," explaining with regal exaggeration the wors a handsome, macho, hero/prince faces when he can't get his princess.

Jack (the one that climbs the beanstalk) is performed well by Ken Grider. Grider, Grider, berky interpretation of Jack is right on the mark. Sharon Thomas also fares

well as Jack's mother.

Act Il brings on the surprises and messages as the characters meet new challenges not in the original fairy tales. Rapunzel bemoans her dysfunctional childhood, while Cinderella faces discontent at the castle. Eponine Williams is Junny as Rapunzel, as is Jennifer Combs as Cinderella. Combs' interpretation of "On The Steps of The Palace" creates a cozy ambiance.

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Anthony Sherman is amusingly droll as the bespectacled narrator with a bow-tie. Liss Jesswein and Julie Thomerson add lots of funny punch as Cinderella's sisters.

The show is pulled together with fantastic acenic design by George Kozak, gorgeous costumes by Kris Murrell-Diedrich, with superb technical direction and lighting by John Deierlein.

"Into The Woods" is a lyrical treat by Sondheim, and the Avon Players' production is one of which he would be proud.
