ATTEMPTED ASSAULT
Two workers from the Knollenberg for Congress office on Orchard Lake in Farmington Hills fled the office and called police from a nearby restaurant after three men, who had been outside of the office for about 30 minutes, including one man carrying a pistol, attempted to enter the office on the evening of May 4. other woman locked another door before a third man, described as white, 5 feet 8 and 190 pounds and carrying a small dark pistol, could reach the side door. The women wanted to call police, but were in plain sight of the men. They ran out the back door, jumped over a dividing wall and called police from D. Dennison's at about 9:40 p.m. When police arrived, the white van the men had arrived in was gone.

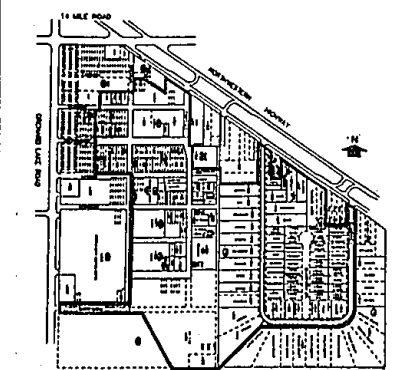
