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Farmington's Baker wins national title

It's protty safe to say Justin Baker of Farmington will be ranked higher on the amateur tennis circuits next

His first-place finish at the Columbus Indoor Junior National Tournsment a week ago virtually assures the 14-year-old player of that.

Baker was unseeded in the tournament, largely because be was rated only the 30th best player at his age in the Western Section; however, he beat the odds and a pair of seeded players to win five matches and the title.

He faced No. 2 Michael Carducci in the final but surprisingly breezed to a straight-set victory in the match, conceding only, one point to his opponent.
