Which is all Terrasi would need, after allowing two runs on 10 hits and no walks, striking out 10, in the first game, she came back to blank the Bears on four hits and one walk, with three strikeouts in the second.

She had to be tired going into game No. 3 Friday, "No, I was not tired," Terrasi insisted after going all cight innings, giving up two earned runs on six hits and one walk, with three strikeouts. "I told myself I wasn't, that I was fine.

"I told myself we deserved to win, because we were thrown to-gether . . . that somehow, some-way we'll do it. We'll find a way."
