Metro Net, a consortium that also includes libraries in West Bloomfield, Birmingham, Bloom field Township, Canton, Independence Township, Richester Hills and Southfield, provides access to computer data bases worldsvide for the cost of a local call from a home computer with a modem, and free from one of the library's terminal, said assistant library director tierald Furn.

A library survey showed 49 percent of Farmington Farmington Hills residents had a personal computer, 25 percent had a computer with a modem and with internal modems, the need for computer generated information
